#### Lesson

Jeremiah's call and commission; impending judgment

Compare what God told Jeremiah in 1:9 with His promise to future generations in 31:33-34. What is the promise God gives to His people today? How is His promise fulfilled in us? What strength or confidence do you receive?

God told Jeremiah a second time, "I am with you and will rescue you" (v 19). Why did Jeremiah need to hear that? Why do we?

Describe the change in God's relationship with His people? What happened to change their relationship?

What lessons do you learn about handling truth well?

Deuteronomy 18:20 commanded the people to put false prophets to death. Interestingly, they ignored God's command when it came to the genuine false prophets among them, but applied it to God's true prophet among them. Why do you think this was?

Lesson 8

"Seek the Lord with all your heart." In what ways is it possible to become identified with the blessings of God or the symbols for God instead of keeping our faith deeply rooted in Jesus Christ? What happens when we allow that to happen in our lives?

What do you learn from Jeremiah about handling difficult situations and people in opposition to God and His word?

What lessons stand out to you from Jeremiah's experience in the temple courts?

#### Lesson

Listening to the authoritative word of God

God's word gives instructions to His people about ways we are to submit even today. What examples can you think of? What lies do some listen to and thereby choose not to submit? What are some of the consequences?

Where do you find yourself? Despairing from no hope, living in false hope, or trusting with true hope? What do you need to hear from Jeremiah's message? What can you share with someone else?

What would you tell others is the basis for your hope, especially when all evidence argues against it? What difference has it made for you – your hope, your obedience, your decisions about life – to know that God remains the same and is faithful in keeping His promises? How specific can you be?

What does this passage teach us about God's justice and mercy? How does this reading challenge your understanding of God's divine justice, mercy and the consequences of disobedience?

What does this section of scripture teach us about God's sovereignty amidst political and social unrest?
